Different people hold the pond for drinking water consumption. they collect water to wash their clothes the area is wet, there are many seeds in it, some household use the seeds to make baskets, gloves etc which they use and sell for income

The pond is also important for cultural practices and if the quality of the water is compromised it will pose a hazard to our health and cultural rights

The construction of the power station will lead to the water being polluted to the pond, also there is a possibility of underground water contamination which will further reduce the quality of the pond. This will affect our health and livelihood which we have consistently had for several

On behalf of the Haverklip and Brakfontein community we give the testimony that the development of the KiPower Station will have effects on our health and livelihoods.

I am an adult who grew up in a small farm which is close to the proposed site of the power station, we currently experiencing problems from the mine operated by Kuyasa mine, the same company that wants to construct the power station.

The Power Station will be built next to Wilge River as resident of Haverklip/Brakfontein, we use the river for several purposes; namely our livestock cows and goats drink water from the river, different households rely on the river for drinking water consumption, to collect water to wash their clothes. The area is wet therefore its growing reeds in it and some households use the reed to make mat and other baskets which they sell for income. The river is also important for cultural purposes, and if the quality of the water is compromised it will pose a huge risk on health and cultural rights.

The construction of the power station will lead to dirty water being discarded to the river also there is a possibility of underground water contamination, which will destroy the quality of the river. This will affect our health and livelihoods which we have consistently had for decades.
